Final examinations should be administered according to the above schedule. If the final examination is given at a time earlier than that indicated above, the last meeting of the class shall be the examination period indicated in the above table.

Classes not assigned by the above schedules may use any time during the examination days that is mutually agreeable to faculty and students concerned, provided it is scheduled no later than Thursday, December 14, and no student has conflict with another examination.

Instructors of 5-credit courses that do not occupy the same classroom five days a week, who wish to give a three-hour examination, must ascertain whether or not there is a 2- or 3-credit course occupying the classroom on the other days of the week that will be holding an examination scheduled for the 10:30 hour. If that proves to be the case, the instructor must arrange for another examination room by calling Room Assignments 543-1080.

All students in undergraduate courses shall be required to take final examinations, provided that in a course for which an examination is not an appropriate test of the work covered, the instructor may dispense with the final examination.

Working students are responsible for arranging their work hours to enable them to attend the final examinations.

A student absent from a scheduled final examination, either by permission of his dean or through sickness or other unavoidable cause, shall be given a grade of Incomplete if his work in that course has been satisfactory until the time of his absence. He may remove this Incomplete in the manner provided for the removing of Incomplete grades. In all other cases of absence from the scheduled final examination, a student should be given a grade of E.

*Classes in which the entire class meets at the same hour every day may use 8:30-11:20 or 2:30-5:20 for the examination; but in 5-credit courses that meet Monday and Wednesday, or Monday, Wednesday, and Friday for lecture, with quizzes or laboratories at various hours, there may be students who have other classes meeting on Tuesday and Thursday at the same hours as the Monday and Wednesday, or Monday, Wednesday, and Friday lectures. In order not to penalize those students who will have an examination in the Tuesday and Thursday course from 10:30-12:20 or 4:30-6:20 the same day, and to ensure equity, the examination must be terminated at the end of one hour and fifty minutes and all examination papers must be collected.

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GENERAL INFORMATION

See each quarter's registration poster for exact dates and deadlines.

It is the University's expectation that a student will follow University rules and regulations as they are stated in the *General Catalog*. In instances where no appeal procedure is spelled out and the student is persuaded that a special set of circumstances makes appeal reasonable, he may appeal the application of specific rules or regulations to the Office of the Dean of the school or college in which he is enrolled in the case of an academic matter, or to the Office of Student Affairs in the case of a nonacademic matter. These offices will either render a decision on the appeal or refer the student to the proper office for a decision.

1. All students currently in school who plan to register for the following quarter must make a \$50.00 advance payment of tuition and fees to guarantee their place for the next quarter. Continuing matriculated students will be allowed to complete their preregistration only if the \$50.00 prepayment has been made. Matriculated students who pay their \$50.00 but do not complete preregistration may obtain an appointment to go through in-person registration.

2. It is the student's responsibility to plan and select the required courses for his degree objective. Consult the *General Catalog* for degree requirements. Be sure to check also with your department advisory office because not all the material in the *Catalog* is up to date.

3. Please note the following:

a. *Selective Service* requires full-time registration to maintain student status.

b. International students on student visas should register for a minimum of 12 credits per quarter; with graduate status, for 9 credits.

c. *Veterans*: Minimum full-time load exclusive of lower-division ROTC and physical education activity is as follows:

P.L. 815 and 894 (Disabled Veterans): Official Programs must be approved by training officers each quarter.

P.L. 358 (Veterans Act of 1966): 12 credits.

P.L. 634 (Children of Deceased and Totally Disabled Veterans): 12 credits.

Veterans who are graduate and/or Summer Quarter students should consult with the Office of Veteran Affairs regarding minimum credits required to be full-time students.

d. *Social Security*: Students who receive benefit payments from the Social Security Administration or Railroad Retirement Board must register for 12 credits for full-time status.

REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

1. Obtain an Official Mark-Sense Program Sheet from your adviser's office.

2. Print with a **BLACK LEAD PENCIL** on your Mark-Sense Program Sheet.

a. Fill in all information, including your Permanent Student Number.

b. Follow the detailed instructions on the work sheet.

c. Check to be certain that you have the prerequisites, as indicated in the *General Catalog* and by your department, for the courses you select.

d. All courses offered within the College of Arts and Sciences which have an "Honors" designation require a permission card.

e. Obtain course permission cards where indicated in this *Time Schedule*. If you are registering for a course out-of-quarter, obtain the required permission form at your advisory office and request the course during the change-of-registration period.

f. If you have a known conflict of hours for which some adjustment could be made, obtain permission for the conflict from the departments concerned. Mark the "approved-conflict" boxes on the Mark-Sense Program Sheet for those courses in conflict.

g. Take your Mark-Sense Program Sheet to your adviser for his signature, if required.

h. If you work or require free time when classes must not be scheduled, mark the Free Time Boxes that correspond to the times you *do not* want classes assigned.

3. Fee payment.

a. You will be mailed a fee statement during the third week of the quarter.

b. Mail your fee payment to the Cashier in the envelope provided, before the due date indicated.

c. If payment is not received by the date specified on your fee statement, your registration will be cancelled and you will continue to owe one-half of your tuition and fees plus \$25.00 enrollment service charge.

d. Students who reregister after cancellation for non-payment of fees will be assessed a \$15.00 late registration service charge.

PREREGISTRATION ONLY

1. Take your Mark-Sense Program Sheet to the second floor, Schmitz Hall. (Engineering students go to 353 Loew Hall.)

2. Follow posted instructions.

3. You will not be scheduled for more than 19 credits. If you wish more than 19 credits, they must be requested on or after the first day of classes.

4. You will be mailed a copy of your scheduled program in November.

IN-PERSON REGISTRATION ONLY

1. On the day and time of your appointment:

a. Present your approved Mark-Sense Program Sheet and your appointment card at the Registration Office, second floor, Schmitz Hall. (Engineering students go to 353 Loew Hall.)

b. You will not be scheduled for more than 19 credits. If you wish additional credits, they must be requested on or after the first day of classes.

LATE REGISTRATION

Students who register after the official registration period will be charged a \$15 late registration fee.

CHANGE OF PROGRAM

Drop or Add

1. Obtain a Change of Program card at your advisory office and have it approved by your adviser, if required. Obtain permission cards, where indicated in this *Time Schedule*, for any courses that you plan to enter. All changes involving Freshman English courses must be authorized in writing by the Freshman English office, A11 Padelford.

2. Present the Change of Program card at the Registration Office, second floor, Schmitz Hall, where you will be given an appointment for Sections. (Engineering students go to 353 Loew Hall.)

3. Students who drop one or more courses may qualify for a lower level of fees, depending on the number of credits the student continues to carry. If the change is made during the official change period, fees will be assessed at the lower rate. If the change is made after the official change period and through the thirtieth calendar day of the quarter, half the difference between the two categories will be assessed in addition to the lower tuition rate. If the change is made after the thirtieth calendar day of the quarter, there is no reduction in the amount of tuition and fees owed.

4. After the official change period, a service charge of \$5 will be assessed for each change of program, change of section, or drop from a course, or any number of changes that are made to a program at the same time.

WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY

1. Obtain a withdrawal form from your advisory office, and have it approved by your adviser.

2. Present the withdrawal form to the withdrawal area, 101 Schmitz Hall, in Sections. Withdrawal is not official until the form is presented to the Registrar's Office.

3. a. Students who make a complete withdrawal from the University prior to the sixth day of instruction of the quarter forfeit the \$50 advance payment, but are not subject to any additional payment of tuition and fees. The \$50 advance fee payment is not refundable or transferable to another individual or quarter.

b. Students who make a complete withdrawal between the sixth day of instruction and the thirtieth calendar day of the quarter are subject to payment of one-half of their total fees plus a \$25 enrollment service charge.

c. Students withdrawing after the thirtieth calendar day receive no refund of fees.

COLLEGE OF ARCHITECTURE AND URBAN PLANNING

ARCHITECTURE

NEW

596 Field Work in Professional Practice (9)

On-location study under the supervision of a practicing professional involved in an aspect of environmental design. The context and content of study shall be proposed by the student and entail experience demonstrated to be both consistent with and expansive upon the student's program of study. Weekly seminars to discuss and evaluate participation will be required in addition to field work. Prerequisite, permission of the Professional Studies Committee.

NEW

598 Special Topics for Graduate Students (1-4)

Systematic study of specialized subject matter. Topic varies for each quarter depending upon current interest and needs and is announced in the preceding quarter. May be repeated for credit. Prerequisites, graduate standing and permission.

NEW

599 Terminal Project for Professional Degree (*)

Terminal project for nonthesis graduate professional program in architecture, requiring a supervisory committee as with thesis option. Prerequisite, graduate standing.

LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE

NEW

421 Landscape Horticulture (3)

Basic horticultural principles with special attention given to the problems encountered in urban situations. Course deals with design implications and the effect of environmental influences such as wind, sun, heat, precipitation, and soil on plant growth, maintenance, and related cost factors.

NEW

470 Landscape Architecture Tutorial (2, max. 6)

Tutorial course concerned with various aspects of project organization, programming, scheduling of work loads, graphic and verbal communication problems, data collection methods and interpretation, methodologies for landscape planting and design. Prerequisites, fourth- or fifth-year standing and one quarter advance permission.

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

ART

NEW

451 Advanced Printmaking (5, max. 15)

Advanced studio projects in printmaking. Prerequisite, 450.

NEW

460 Advanced Metal Design (5, max. 15)

Advanced individual projects in metal design. Prerequisite, 459.

ANTHROPOLOGY

NEW

445 Quantitative and Statistical Methods in Anthropology (3)

Quantitative methods and inferential statistics intended for students in anthropology. Prerequisite, 202 or ARCHY 205 or PHY A 201.

NEW

486 Practicum in African Languages (3)

Introduction to specific African languages with an emphasis on teaching skills which can be acquired in a language laboratory setting. One language will be taught each time the course sequence is offered. Shona will be offered in 1973. Other languages are Hausa, Yoruba, Twi, Duala. Students will be encouraged to converse with each other using skills learned via tapes and explanations supplied by the instructor.

ARCHAEOLOGY

NEW

590 Advanced Archaeological Analysis (6)

Practical laboratory instruction in the preparation of regional scale archaeological data for analysis, attribute recognition and analysis, stylistic and functional analysis, pattern recognition, and correlative analysis of edaphic, floral, and faunal data in a controlled laboratory case. Prerequisite, permission.

ASIAN LANGUAGES AND LITERATURE

Tagalog

NEW

102 Elementary Tagalog (5)

Introduction to the spoken language through oral-aural drills, emphasizing pronunciation and elementary conversation. Grammatical elements and basic structures are introduced. Some reading and writing exercises.

ASTRONOMY

NEW

500 Seminar in Elementary Astronomy Instruction (1)

Seminar in the preparation of lecture and workshop materials with emphasis on demonstration and visual aids, and on evaluation of students' progress.

NEW

576 Astronomy Colloquium (1)

Current research topics in astronomy and astrophysics. Prerequisite, permission.

ATMOSPHERIC SCIENCES

NEW

521 Seminar in Atmospheric Dynamics (*)

Seminar will be directed at current research in the subject. For advanced students. Prerequisite, permission.

NEW

523 Seminar in Cloud Physics (*)

See Atmospheric Sciences 521 for course description.

NEW

524 Seminar in Energy Transfer (*)

See Atmospheric Sciences 521 for course description.

NEW

526 Seminar in Glaciology (*)

See Atmospheric Sciences 521 for course description.

BOTANY

NEW

501 Tutorial in Botany (2, max. 10)

Small group study and discussion, as a tutorial, of a specified topic in the plant sciences, largely in fields not covered by courses and existing special-area seminars. Impetus for registration would come from two or more graduate students finding a faculty member who shares with them an interest in the topic. Prerequisite, permission.

DRAMA

NEW

378 History of the English Theatre and Its Drama: 1500-1700 (3)

Examination of the relationship of the physical theatre and the productions which took place within that theatre, with particular emphasis on the text performed, styles of acting, scenic elements, and the critical theories which influenced the theatre of the period.

NEW

510 Design Studio I (3 or 5, max. 13)

Three-quarter sequential investigation of space, light, texture, and color in total theatre design concurrently stressing mastery of the media and methods of presentation and execution. Prerequisite, concurrent registration in 517 or 518 or 519.

GENERAL AND INTERDISCIPLINARY STUDIES

Descriptions of GIS course offerings are available during preregistration and in-person registration in the office of the Division of General and Interdisciplinary Studies, C18 Padelford Hall.

GEOGRAPHY

NEW

415 Agricultural Systems and Regions (3)

Designed to provide the student with a deeper understanding of the operation of farms, their spatial variation, and the methods of analysis of agricultural systems and regions. The student will be expected to devote approximately 12 hours of time to supervised field work. The timing of field trips will be arranged by the class. Prerequisite, 315 or permission.

NEW

348 Concepts of Love and Adventure in German Courtly Literature (3)

The nature and scope of bioengineering will be considered in relation to manpower requirements, health care facilities, distribution of care, data processing, data sources, and projections of future technological needs for various clinical specialties. Primarily for students in medicine, public health and community medicine, or bioengineering.

470 Engineering Approaches to the Cardiovascular System (3)

Concerned with the engineering techniques and physiological concepts appropriate to a quantitative approach to the cardiovascular system. Current literature will be used together with texts, and guest lecturers will discuss specialized topics. Prerequisites, senior standing and permission; some previous exposure to physiology recommended.

472 Diagnostic Ultrasound (3-6)

Basic principles of ultrasound. A-mode applications, including delineation of mid-brain structures, differentiating solid from cystic lesions, and measurement of bi-parietal diameters. TM-mode applications, including delineation of intracardiac structures, such as mitral valve and pericardial effusions. B-mode scans of liver, spleen, kidneys, retroperitoneal structures, and uterus. Pulse and continuous Doppler applications. Teaching will be by informal tutorials with laboratory and ward experience in the various ultrasound techniques. Prerequisite, permission.

340 Applications of Digital Computers to Problems in Resource Management (4)

Methods and procedure for processing biological and natural resource data by means of digital computers; problem analysis, elementary programming, use of package programs for statistical analysis. Prerequisite, 281.

393 Techniques of Applied Mathematics in Biology II (3)

The applications of advanced ordinary differential equations, special functions, and partial differential equations to descriptions of biological phenomena. Particular emphasis will be placed on transport in biological systems including diffusion and fluid flow. Prerequisite, 392 or permission.

461 Thermodynamics of Life Processes (4)

Thermodynamics of life processes with particular application of the fuel energy functions to descriptions of life processes. Applications to processes in the atmosphere, dilute solutions, soil systems, and living cells. Introduction to the concepts of entropy and biology. Prerequisites, 291, 292, Biology 210, 211, 212.

Prerequisites, a comprehensive course in biochemistry and permission.

Exercises include tests for carbon compound utilization, nutritional requirements, quantitative determinations of fermentation products, isolation of mutants, and assays of enzymes in cell-free extracts. Prerequisite, concurrent registration in 430.

Current problems in microbiological research. Prerequisite, permission.

Selected topics in the cardiovascular, renal, respiratory, and nervous systems that illustrate physiological changes in clinical disease and clinical examples of basic physiologic principles. Prerequisite, permission.

Study of realistic, creative, and social activities as used in occupational therapy. Techniques, analysis, adaptation, and application of the media will be investigated with accent upon a realistic approach.

Process of collecting, analyzing, and interpreting assessment data basic to formulating occupational therapy treatment objectives. Emphasis will be placed on the importance of ascertaining all ability requirements for human functional performance with the social, emotional, physical, and culturally handicapped. Prerequisite, occupational therapy major.

NEW

489 Alcohol Problems in Family and Society (3)

Analysis of significant problems experienced by the family in the presence of alcoholism, with emphasis on sociocultural and psychological influences and related physiological implications. Theories of prevention and counseling are examined. Case studies and clinical presentations are utilized, and serve to synthesize learning in the process of nursing intervention. Open to baccalaureate students of junior and senior standing and to students of graduate programs.

Students will be expected to gain familiarity with the basic principles of experimental design and the variations necessitated by their application in practical settings. Case studies will be used to illustrate the various types of evaluation. Offered jointly with the Graduate School of Public Affairs as Public Policy 514. Prerequisites, adequate background in quantitative methods (e.g., biostatistics, PC BS 512 or 513) and permission of instructor.

SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK

NEW

421 Methods of Child Care and Treatment (2)

Major foci include an introduction to the continuum of child welfare services, as well as some practical approaches to working with children and adolescents in a wide variety of practice settings.

503 Social Policy Analysis (2)

An approach to the systematic analysis of social policies and of their adequacy and effectiveness in achieving certain goals. Identification of societal trends and emerging social needs related to the development of anticipatory policies.

Analysis of major issues and problem areas in social welfare, examined in the content of existing methodologies and programs and covering such problem areas as crime and delinquency, poverty, illness and disability, etc.

560 Analytic Foundations of Community and Organizational Development Practice (4)

INDEPENDENT STUDY COURSES THROUGH CORRESPONDENCE

The Division of Independent Study provides University courses for extension credit primarily by correspondence instruction to persons who wish individual instruction. Fees for Independent Study courses are separate from residence tuition and are \$15 per credit. Enrollment is not based on the quarter system but is continuous throughout the year, with one calendar year allowed to complete a course.

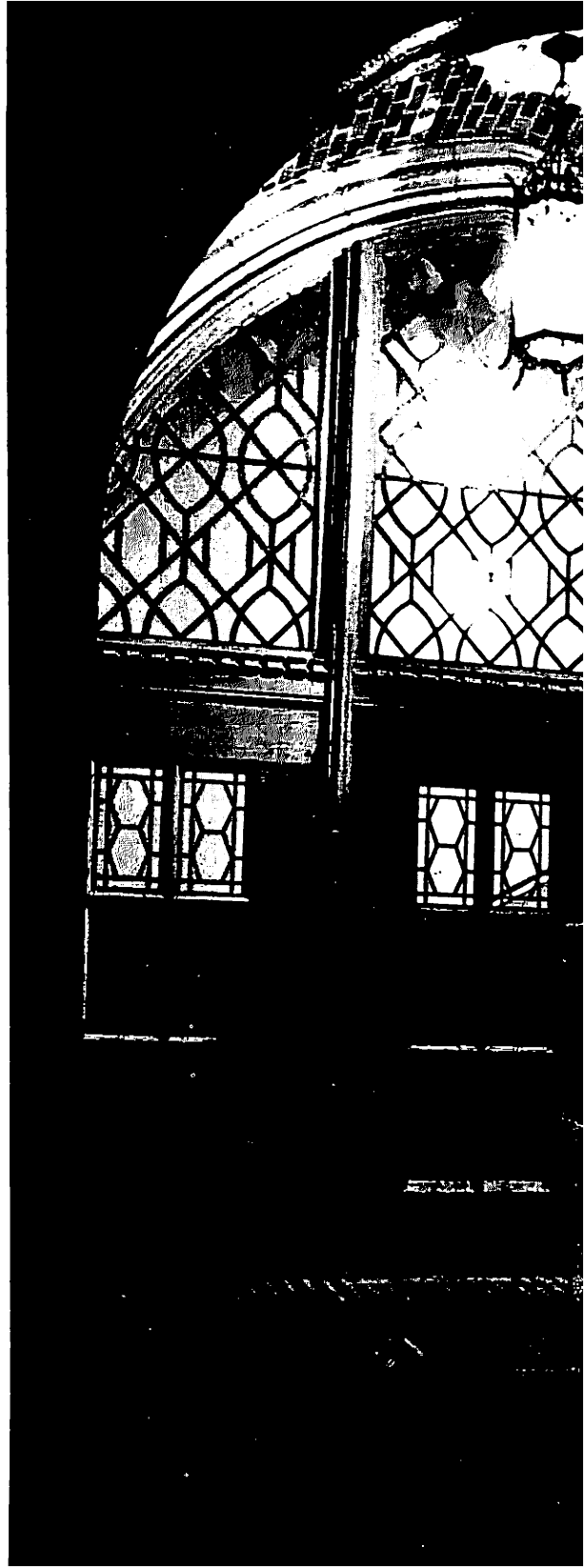

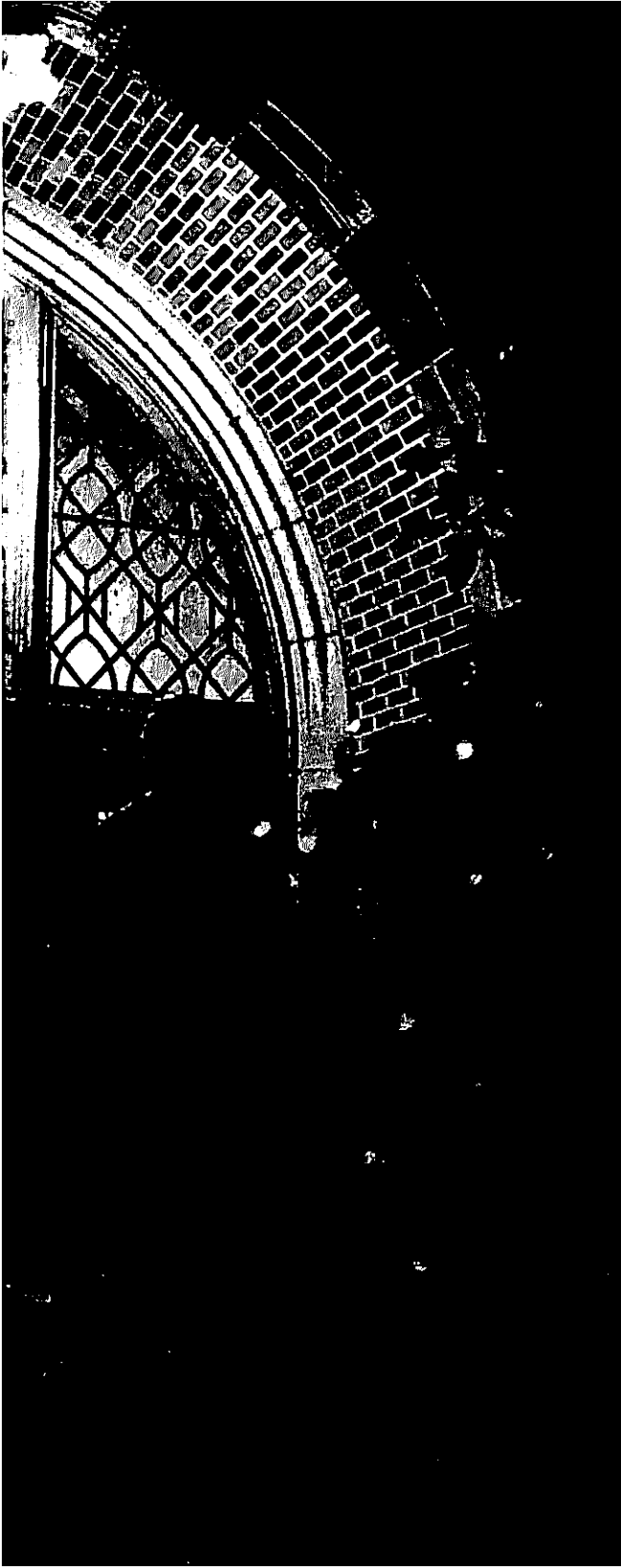

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CONTINUING EDUCATION AT THE UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON

Continuing efforts are being made by the University of Washington to integrate the programs of day and evening credit classes in order to provide broader opportunities, through evening instruction, for those adults unable to attend day classes, as well as for regular daytime students. Several significant steps have been taken toward this goal since 1963.

First, regular academic credit was accorded evening instruction, and the restriction limiting the number of evening class credits applicable toward a degree was removed. Subsequently, regular residence and admission requirements, as well as scholarship standards, were incorporated into the evening program, replacing the less demanding requirements and standards which had prevailed for many years. Finally, a uniform fee scale was applied to both evening and day classes, and an additional forward step was taken by removal of evening credit classes from the ranks of the University's self-sustaining activities, allowing state funds to be drawn upon for the support of evening credit classes.

The evidence suggests that these steps were well conceived and well received. During Winter Quarter 1969 there were 3,405 students registered in both day and evening classes and 1,238 enrolled in evening classes only, for a total of 4,643 evening students.

However, it is important to affirm that the above procedural changes do not represent an effort to effect a direct transplant of daytime policies to the evening program, which would make evening courses simply an extension of the day structure. It is the purpose of Continuing Education at the University of Washington to develop special classes and services particularly suited to the needs of the employed adult. In short, instruction for the evening student has been and will continue to be of special concern and importance to this University.

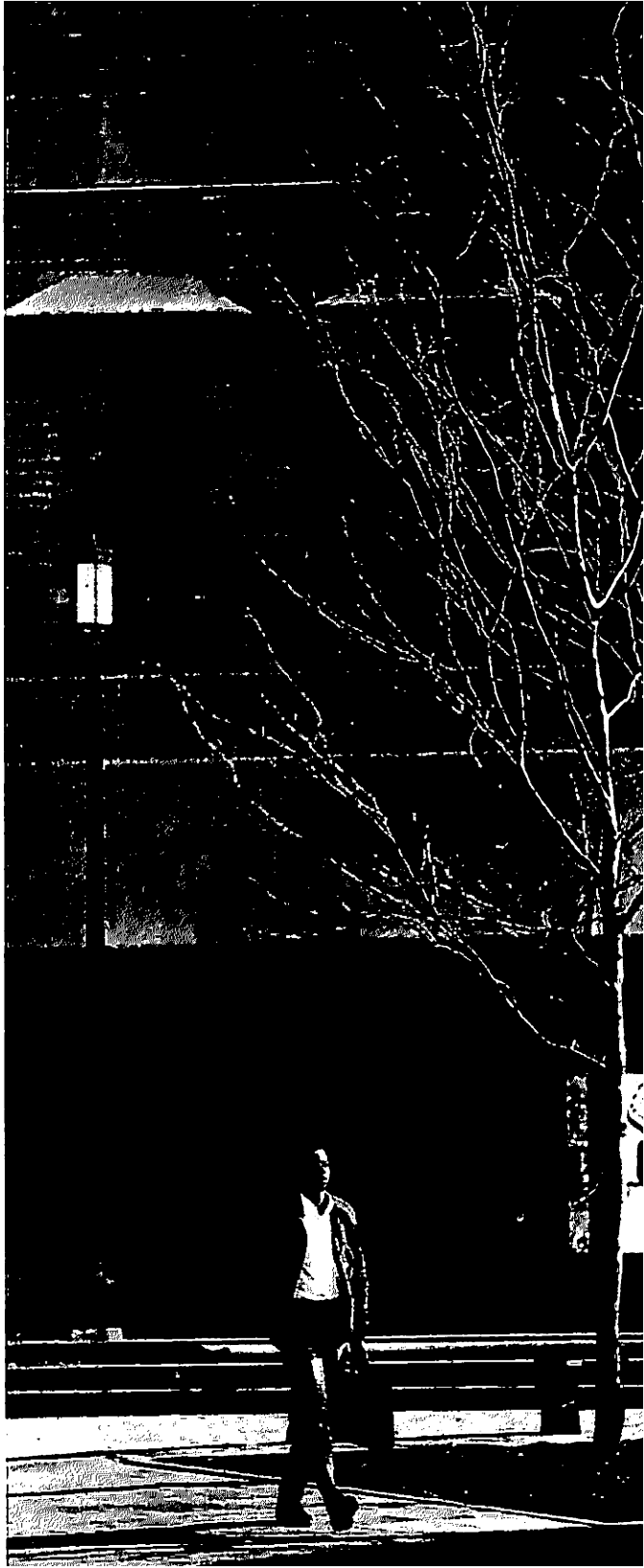

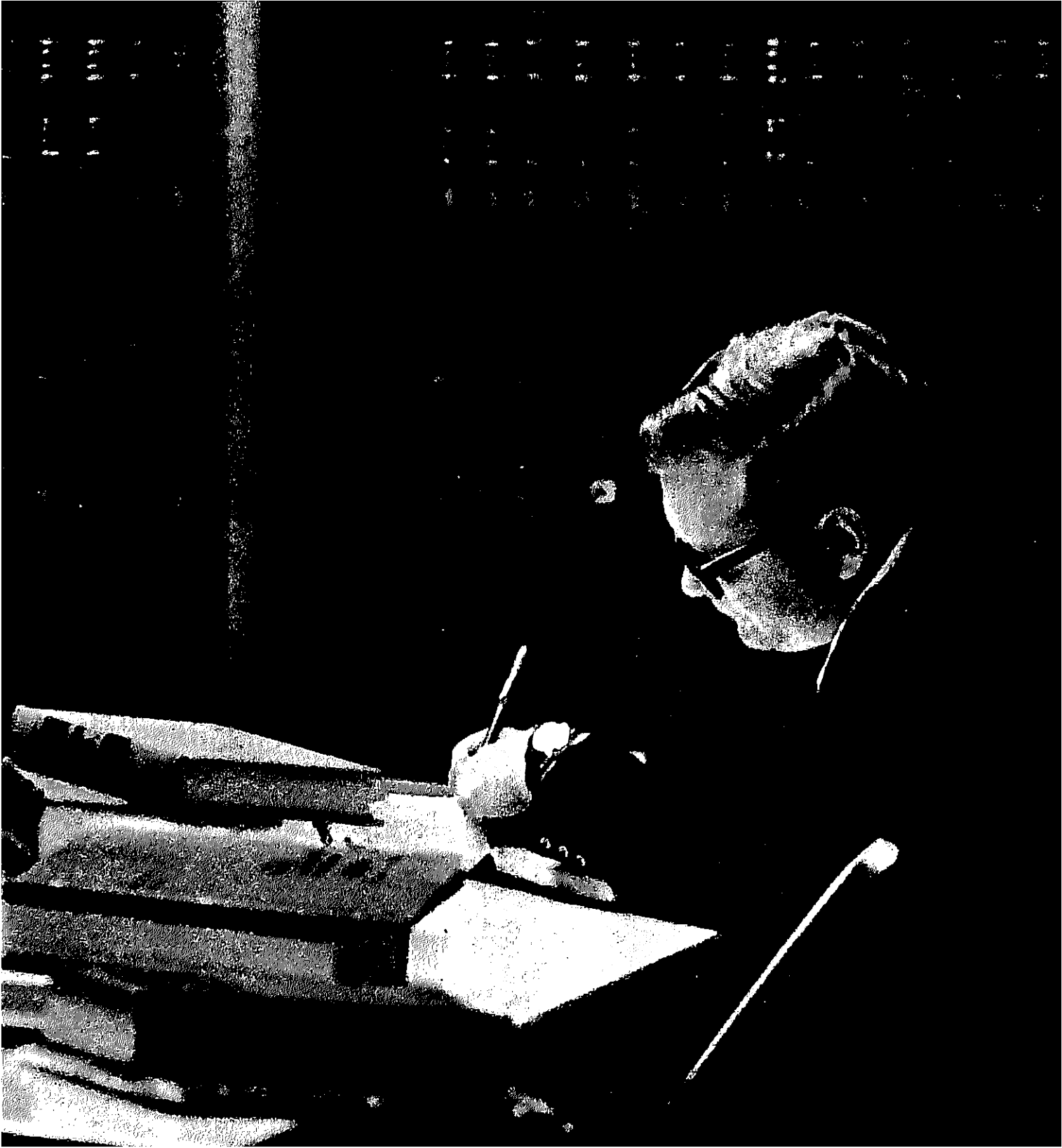

All undergraduate students registered for credit at the University, whether matriculated or nonmatriculated, are subject to the University requirement that they maintain a grade-point average of 2.00. Detailed information on grades and scholarship rules may be found in the Rules and Regulations section of the *General Catalog*.

STUDENT RECORDS AND GRADE REPORTS

Students' quarterly grade reports are mailed to them automatically by the Registrar.

A transcript is an official copy of the student's entire University credit record; it bears the seal of the University and the signature of the Registrar. Transcripts may be ordered at 109 Administration Building at \$1.00 per copy.

COURSE DESIGNATIONS

A hyphen (-) before or after a course number indicates a series in which credit is given only upon completion of the final course of the series

Credits: The amount of academic credit appears in parentheses following the course title; e.g. (5) indicates 5 quarter credits

Quarter: The quarter in which a course is to be given appears following the credits (e.g. AWSp indicates Autumn, Winter, and Spring Quarters)

Numbers: 100-299 are lower-division freshman and sophomore) courses
300-499 are upper-division (junior and senior) courses
500 and above are graduate courses

PARKING

Permits are on sale at the Security Division, located at the campus entrance on N.E. 40th Street and 15th Avenue N.E. Single-night parking fees may be paid at the 17th Avenue N.E. entrance, parking lot A (on the basis of available space), and at the lower east side of the campus on Montlake Boulevard (coin-operated gates).

CAMPUS LIBRARIES

A schedule for the main library, the Suzzallo Library, is posted quarterly. Consult bulletin boards at Suzzallo Library entrances for schedule changes.

Reserve books in the Suzzallo Library are located in the Undergraduate Reading Room, plaza level, telephone 543-1947.

Most branch libraries are open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Some branch libraries are open only two or three evenings weekly and have a short schedule on Saturdays and Sundays. For details, consult the specific branch library or the General Reference and Information Service in the Suzzallo Library, telephone 543-0242.

ADMISSIONS

A student, whether he expects to attend the University for only one quarter or intends to continue throughout the academic year, may be admitted in one of several student classifications. Admission may be as a matriculated student, either graduate or undergraduate, as a nonmatriculated student, or as a visiting graduate student. In cases where special arrangements have been made with the academic department, a person may register in an evening credit class on a noncredit basis. Such registration is handled by the Division of Continuing Studies. The fee is the same as would be required for an equivalent credit registration.

New Requirement for Autumn Quarter: A \$50.00 deposit is required before the issuance of registration appointments to new students, former students, and continuing students who do not complete advance registration. The \$50.00 is applied to tuition when the student registers, but it is not transferable to another person or quarter. It is refundable to students who receive full tuition benefits.

Appointments and applications are available at Window 3, Administration Building lobby, or by calling 543-5920 or writing to the University of Washington Registrar, Seattle, Washington 98105.

Former students not currently enrolled may obtain registration application forms either in person (at Window 3, Administration Building lobby) or by calling 543-5920. Applicants for admission may obtain admissions forms by writing the Office of Admissions, or by calling 543-5890 for undergraduate applications or 543-5929 for applications to the Graduate School.



New students attending day or evening classes should submit applications and credentials prior to deadline dates. (Notice of acceptance and a registration appointment will be mailed to each successful applicant.)

Returning students not currently registered should fill out a Returning-Student Application Form prior to deadline dates above.

ADVISING APPOINTMENTS

Matriculated students should obtain a program of study from their advisers prior to registration.

Premajors and preprofessional students must confer with an adviser in the Arts and Sciences Advisory Office, B10 Padelford Hall. Telephone 543–2550 for an appointment well in advance of the registration period.

Nonmatriculated students—those persons not formally enrolled in University degree programs—must confer with the adviser in the Evening Classes Advisory Office, 222 Lewis Hall. Telephone 543–2330 for an appointment well before the registration period.

REGISTRATION

Before registration—

Plan a tentative program of study. Be sure to select several alternate courses to which you can be assigned if your preferred classes are filled.

Complete required tests. If you need the English or Mathematics Placement Tests, go to the Bureau of Testing in Lewis Annex during the day. If you are unable to take the test during the day, arrangements can be made for testing during the late afternoon or evening through the Bureau of Testing, telephone 543–1170.

Confer with the adviser for an approved program of study. All students must obtain an approved program of study from an adviser. Confer with the adviser well in advance of registration. *Matriculated* students see their major-department advisers. Check with specific departments for advisory hours. *Nonmatriculated* students should telephone Evening Classes, 543–2330, for appointments.

REGISTRATION DAY

New undergraduate students should report for registration clearance at Raitt Hall (for Autumn Quarter) or Thomson Hall (for Winter and Spring Quarters) at the time indicated on notice of admission forms.

Registration clearance is not required for nonmatriculated students at any time. These students, as well as new graduate students and all returning registrants, begin registration in the Administration Building lobby. It is necessary to bring registration appointment cards and approved official program forms at the time of registration.

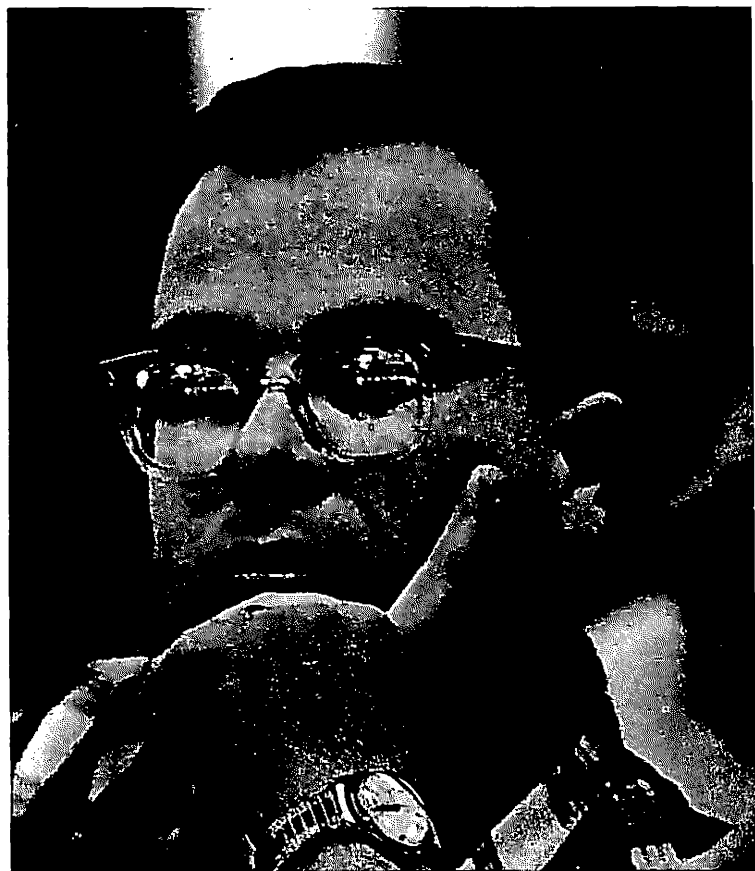
CHANGE OF PROGRAM

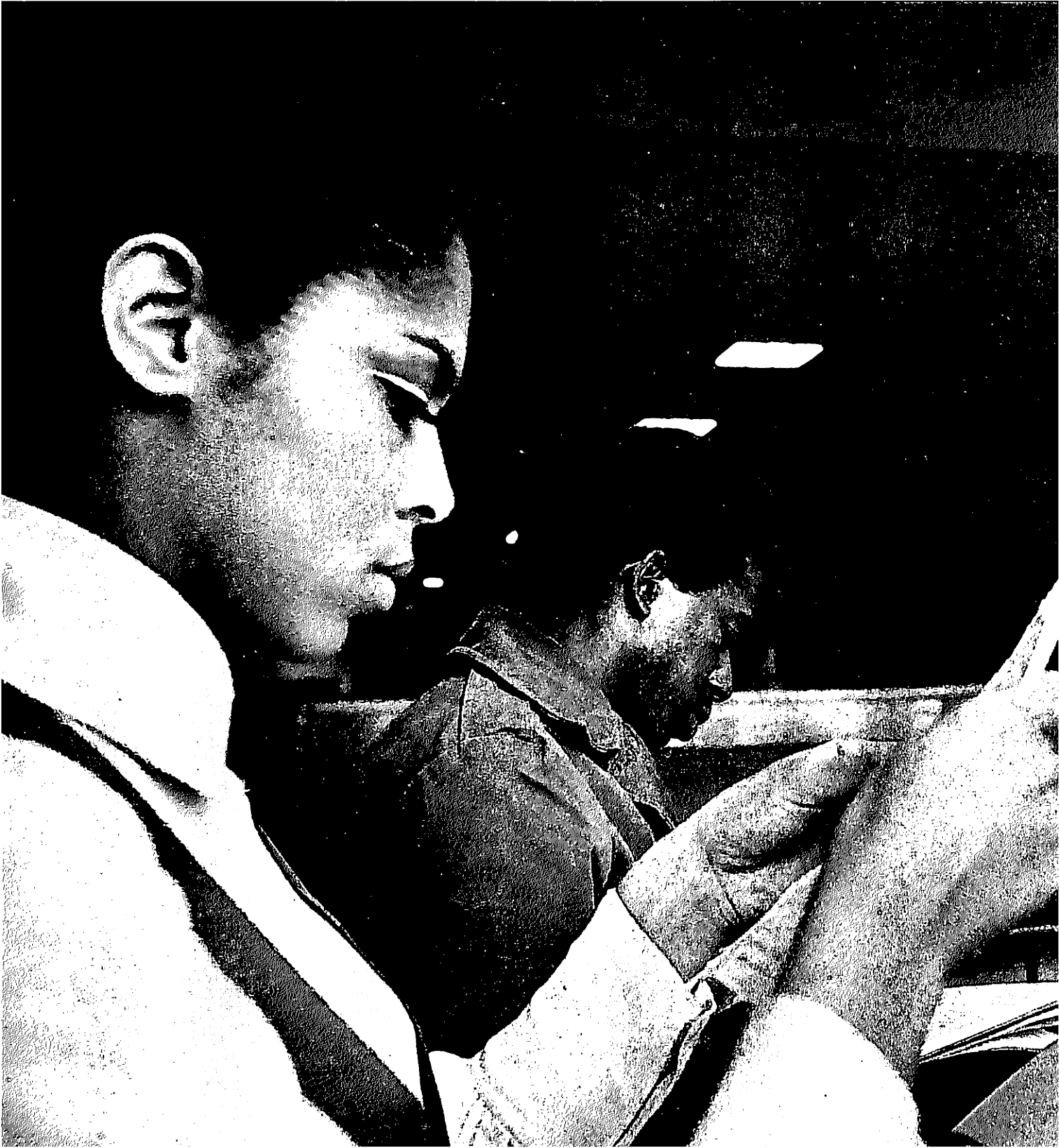
Program changes are processed during the first week of each quarter at Sections, 101 Administration Building, by appointment only. Appointments may be obtained by presenting a completed change of program card, approved by an adviser, at Window 3, Administration Building lobby. There is a \$5.00 charge for each change of program. See the *General Catalog* for further details.

WITHDRAWAL

Voluntary withdrawal from the University is initiated by the student in consultation with an adviser. Inquiries regarding refunds should be directed to the Cashier's Office, telephone 543-4696.

Special privileges are granted students whose withdrawal is the result of induction by or enlistment in the armed forces. These privileges are also described in the *General Catalog*.





CONTINUING EDUCATION

Continuing Education at the University of Washington includes four major divisions, as described below.

THE DIVISION OF EVENING CLASSES makes it possible for academic departments to conduct late afternoon, evening, and Saturday credit courses for adults on campus and in communities within the state.

Classes are offered primarily for those who desire to further their education but are not free to attend daytime classes. The program offers men and women an opportunity to pursue intellectual interests and vocational advancement, to realize degree aspirations, and to enrich their personal and professional lives.

Approximately two hundred credit courses are offered under the evening classes program each quarter of the academic year. Most of these are on the undergraduate level in the College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Business Administration, and the Colleges of Education and Engineering.

Persons wishing to pursue baccalaureate degrees in these areas will find a fairly liberal offering of required and elective courses in anthropology, art, economics, English, mathematics, psychology, sociology, and speech. A broad range of undergraduate courses

is available in business administration, and a limited number of courses are offered in the Departments of General Engineering, Civil Engineering, and Electrical Engineering.

The Division of Evening Classes is located at 222 Lewis Hall, telephone 543-2300.

Evening classes are but one facet of the continuing education program, which, seen in retrospect, began in 1912 with the first meetings of extension classes on campus and in adjacent cities. In 1914, an office was opened in the Henry Building, Metropolitan Center, where classes were conducted until 1947. After that date, evening classes were held at the Adult Education Center in the Denny Regrade area in downtown Seattle. All classes were moved to the University campus at the start of Autumn Quarter 1952, and the downtown offices were closed. January 1, 1964, marked the first offering of residence credit for on-campus evening classes.

Other continuing education programs:

THE DIVISION OF CONTINUING STUDIES offers a broad selection of noncredit programs designed to provide individuals with opportunities for personal and professional growth and for wider, deeper understanding of the vital issues of our time.



These programs include week-end residential seminars for intensive exchange of ideas among participants and faculty members, as well as a wide variety of university-level courses on and off campus.

All classes, courses, and seminars are offered without academic credit so that registrants may be free to pursue their interests without formal restrictions.

No grades are given. There are generally no prerequisites, although for some programs prospective students may be asked to evaluate their own backgrounds before registration.

Continuing studies are open to everyone in the adult community and are not limited to persons with college experience.

For detailed information, or to be placed on the mailing list of *Spectrum*, the quarterly publication of continuing education at the University of Washington (available without charge), call 543-2140.

Liberal Arts Seminars consist of a number of week-end residential seminars designed to bring together adult participants and University faculty members for an intensive exchange of ideas on significant social and cultural topics. The seminars, which usually begin with dinner on Friday evening and continue through lunch on Sunday, are held at the University's off-campus Continuing Education Center, Lake Wilderness Lodge, or at commercial resorts within the state. Registration at any one seminar is generally limited to approximately 35, and preference is given to applicants who have not previously participated in the seminar program. *Offices are located in 212 Lewis Hall, telephone 543-0990.*

The Division of Continuing Studies is located at 213 Lewis Hall, telephone 543-2140.

THE DIVISION OF EXTENSION SERVICES includes six departments involving thousands of Washington citizens in noncredit continuing education activities.

The Bureau of Community Development uses the self-study approach to community problems in order

to help individuals discover how they can cooperatively solve their problems. The primary goal is to stimulate citizens to become more interested in and informed about their local communities and to assume greater responsibility as citizens.

Through the use of resource persons, University faculty, and others, citizen committees gain an understanding of the potentialities and limitations of their communities and, through this, may arrive at solutions to local problems.

The Office of Lectures and Concerts cooperates with the Committee on Public Lectures and Concerts and various academic departments in presenting a broad program of outstanding artists and lecturers for the benefit of the University and the community. The Office provides managerial assistance for the School of Music's annual opera series; for symphony, band, and chamber music concerts; and for faculty and student recitals.

Broadcast Services (Radio KUOW-FM—94.9 MHz) offers programs of an educational, cultural, and scientific nature, and communicates information concerning University affairs to students, alumni, and the general public. The station also provides students in the School of Communications with practical experience for careers in radio.

The Office of Short Courses and Conferences assists academic departments in all phases of conference and institute planning and presentation. With appropriate academic sponsorship, programs are arranged not only on the University campus but in many communities throughout the state. The University of Washington Residential Center for Continuing Education, located at Lake Wilderness (Maple Valley, Washington), is operated by this office.

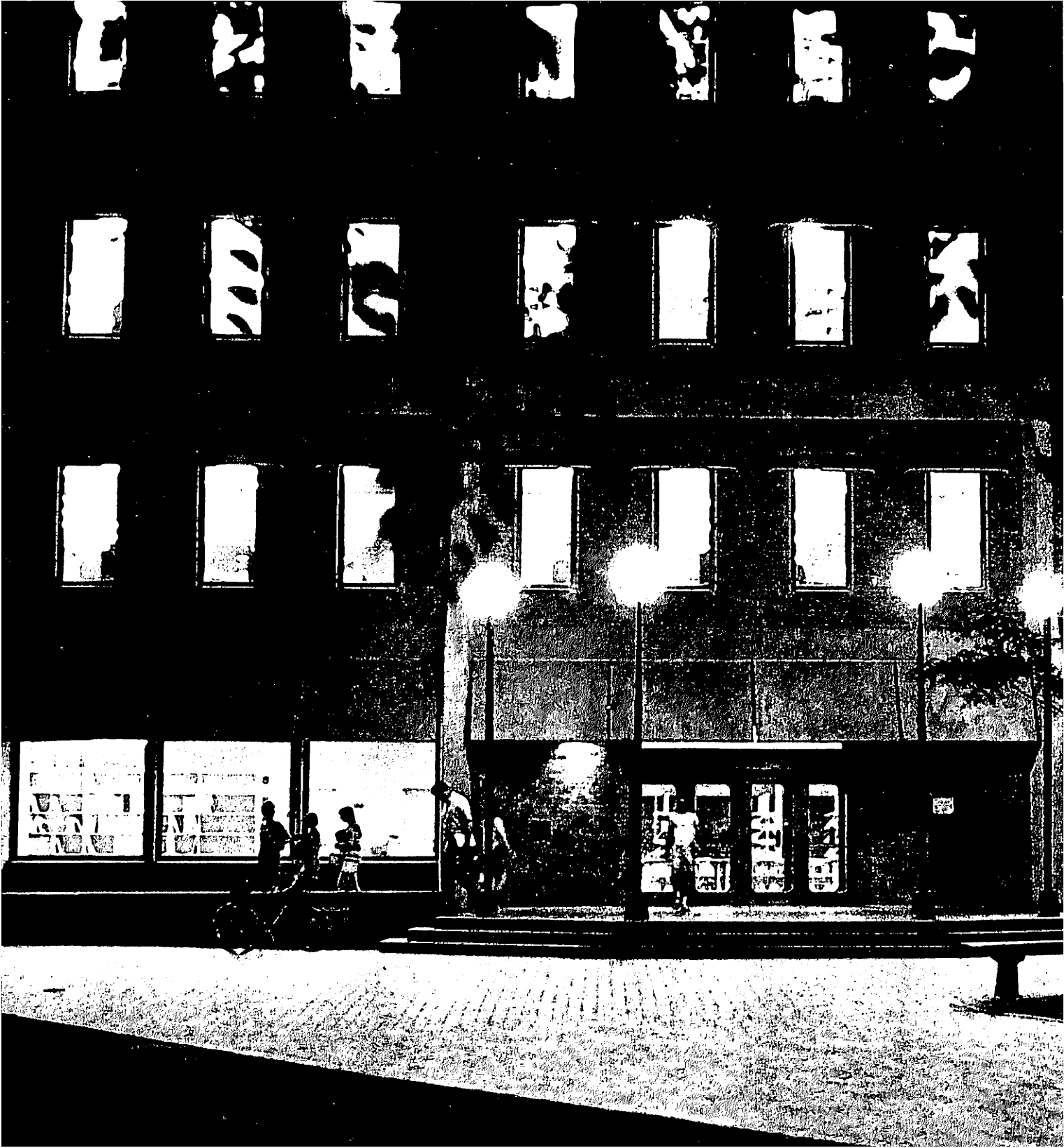
The Office of Telecourses makes it possible for members of the regular University faculty to present a wide variety of subjects in series of half-hour instructional programs. Both commercial and educational television stations in Seattle and throughout the state of Washington cooperate with this office in making these programs available in local viewing areas.

The Office of Civil Defense Training, under contract with the Department of the Army, assists state and local Civil Defense personnel in conducting Professional and Instructor Civil Defense Training courses and educational conferences for government officials at the local level.

The Division of Extension Services is located at 322 Lewis Hall, telephone 543-5380.

THE DIVISION OF CORRESPONDENCE STUDY offers to mature individuals who wish to study independently a choice of nearly two hundred University credit courses in twenty-three fields of study. Courses are prepared and instructed by University faculty members, many of whom teach parallel classes on campus. The correspondence curriculum spans such diverse fields as anthropology, accounting, English literature, writing, oceanography, education, foreign languages, and sociology. Independent-study courses do not follow the University time schedule; the registrant has one calendar year to complete his course, allowing time to study and learn at his individual pace. Within certain limitations, students may apply correspondence credits toward a bachelor's degree or Washington State Standard Teaching Certificate.

The Division of Correspondence Study is located at 203 Lewis Hall, telephone 543-2350.

421 JAPANESE LITERARY TRADITION (5) Sp
A broad inquiry into the literary heritage of Japan through reading and discussion of representative works available in English in prose, poetry, and drama from early beginnings to the mid-nineteenth century. (Formerly 420.)

423 MODERN JAPANESE LITERATURE IN ENGLISH (5) W
Discussion and analysis of representative works, especially of fiction, from the late nineteenth and twentieth centuries. (Formerly 421).

443 STUDIES IN JAPANESE DRAMA IN ENGLISH (5) A
Principal forms, techniques, and theory of No, Kyogen, Joruri, and Kabuki; also the contemporary theater. Aspects of the stage, costume, masks, and other accoutrements of the theater will be discussed, along with its principal playwrights and performers. (Formerly 423).

ATMOSPHERIC SCIENCES

101 SURVEY OF THE ATMOSPHERE (5) A
Composition and structure of the earth's atmosphere; relation of the earth to the sun and consequent geographical temperature distribution; processes within the atmosphere which produce rain, snow, and other condensation phenomena; tropical and extratropical storms, thunderstorms, chinooks, and cold waves.

CHEMISTRY

100 CHEMICAL SCIENCE (5) A
Atoms, molecules, and chemical reactions. A survey of fundamental principles. Designed both as a terminal course for nonscience majors and as an introductory course for those who wish to continue with 101 or 140. (Note the Mathematics prerequisite for 140.) Chemistry 100 is given in two versions—with (Autumn, Summer) and without (Spring) laboratory. The laboratory version is recommended for students who intend to continue with 101 or 140. No credit to those who have had one unit or more of high school chemistry.

140 GENERAL CHEMISTRY (3) AW
For science, engineering, and other majors who plan to take a year or more of chemistry courses. Stoichiometry, kinetic theory, gasses, liquids, solids, chemical equilibrium. Prerequisites, high school chemistry or 100, Mathematics 101 or passing score on algebra qualifying test.

- 150 GENERAL CHEMISTRY (3) WSp
Oxidation-reduction, principles of thermodynamics and kinetics, electronic structure of the atom, the chemical bond. Prerequisite, 140 or 145H.
- 151 GENERAL CHEMISTRY LABORATORY (2) WSp
Experiments illustrating quantitative relationships in chemistry. Prerequisites, 140 or 145H; concurrent registration in or prior completion of 150 or 155H.
- 160 GENERAL CHEMISTRY (3) Sp
The chemistry of representative elements, metals, and nonmetals. Introduction to organic and nuclear chemistry. Prerequisite, 150 or 155H.
- 231 ORGANIC CHEMISTRY (3) W
For students planning only two quarters of organic chemistry. Structure, nomenclature, reactions, and synthesis of the main types of organic compounds. Prerequisite, 150 or 155H.
- 232 ORGANIC CHEMISTRY (3) Sp
Continuation of 231. Prerequisite, 231.
- 241 ORGANIC CHEMISTRY LABORATORY (2) W
Usually to accompany 231. Preparation of representative compounds. Prerequisites, 231 (which may be taken concurrently), 157 or 147H, which may be taken concurrently.
- 242 ORGANIC CHEMISTRY LABORATORY (2) Sp
Usually to accompany 232. Preparations and qualitative organic analysis. Prerequisites, 232 (which may be taken concurrently) and 241.

- 326 MAGAZINE ARTICLE WRITING (3) W
Nonfiction writing for national magazines and for specialized publications. Prerequisite, permission. Open to nonmajors. (Formerly Journalism 404.)
- 338 PUBLIC RELATIONS (3) ASp
Principles and practice of public relations in business, industry, government, and social agencies; policy and conduct as fundamentals in good relationships. Open to nonmajors. (Formerly Communications 303.)
- 344 SPECIAL COPY APPLICATIONS (3) A
Analysis of principles and techniques of national advertising copy; problems in the preparation of trade, industrial, and consumer copy and layouts. Open only to majors. Prerequisites, 341 and 343. (Formerly Advertising 445.)
- 377 THE DOCUMENTARY (3) W
Development of the documentary; background, aims, and creative aspects; function of the documentary in mass media. Open to nonmajors. (Formerly Radio-Television 377.)
- 485 COMPARATIVE COMMUNICATION SYSTEMS (5) A
The structure and functions of communication systems. The role of communication in social change, e.g., politicization, modernization, and other forms of social and political development. Country and regional studies of the structure, control, content, audiences, and effects of communication. Prerequisite, 200 or permission. Open to nonmajors. (Formerly Communications 415).

- 146 THEATRE VOICE AND SPEECH (3) AW
Stage vocal techniques and exercises in practical application. Open to nonmajors. Prerequisite, 151.
- 151 ACTING (3) AWSp
Theory and practice of fundamentals: analysis and practice in aptitudes necessary in acting (focus, recall, imagination, and characterization) through improvisation and scene work. Open to nonmajors. Prerequisite, 146.
- 210 THEATRE TECHNICAL PRACTICE (2 or 4) ASp
Intensive lecture-laboratory course in basic theories, techniques, and equipment of stage scenery; scene construction and scene painting. Crew work required in addition to scheduled class hours.
- 212 THEATRE TECHNICAL PRACTICE (4) W
Intensive lecture-laboratory course in basic theories, techniques, and equipment of stage scenery, lighting, and technical stage procedures. Crew work required in addition to scheduled class hours.
- 324 CHILDREN'S THEATRE (3) A
Theory and techniques using adult and child casts, play selection and analysis, and rehearsal procedures. Emphasis on directing. For nonmajors only.

Organization, operation, and control of the American

Operation of the American economy, with emphasis on prices, wages, production, and distribution of income and wealth; problems of the world economy. Prerequisite, 200 or equivalent, or permission.

Fundamental concepts and principles. Demand, supply, market price, and the determination of price under competitive and monopolistic conditions; relationships between price and costs; income and its functional distribution in capitalistic society. Prerequisites, 201 and Mathematics 105, or equivalent, or permission.
- 301 NATIONAL INCOME ANALYSIS (5) Sp
Analysis of the determinants of the aggregate level of employment, output, and income of an economy. Prerequisites, 201 and Mathematics 105, or equivalent, or permission.
- 340 LABOR ECONOMICS (5) W
Trade unionism, collective bargaining, labor-management relations, public policy; economic effects of unionism and collective bargaining; manpower utilization and related labor market problems. Prerequisites, 211 or 200 and 201, or permission.
- 350 PUBLIC FINANCE AND TAXATION (5) W
An elementary treatment of the theory of public finance; theory of public finance; theory of nonmarket decisions; welfare and allocative effects of taxation; principles of fiscal policy; problems of the public debt. Prerequisite, 201 or equivalent, or permission.

An analysis of psychological development of the child in relation to biological, physical, and sociological antecedent conditions from infancy to adolescence. - 345 SOCIAL PSYCHOLOGY (5) ASp
A study of the interaction of the individual and the group, with emphasis upon interpersonal processes, social motivation, attitude formation and change, leadership, and the relation between personality and social behavior. Prerequisite, 100 or 190.
- 355 THINKING AND PROBLEM SOLVING (5) A
Empirical and theoretical approaches to thinking, problem solving, and concept formation. Prerequisite, 10 credits in psychology, including 100 or 190, or permission.
- 405 ADVANCED PERSONALITY: THEORY AND RESEARCH (5) AW
A more intensive survey of theoretical concepts in the field of personality and a more detailed review of experimental methods and experiments in the field of personality. Prerequisite, 205 or permission.

Historical and theoretical background of the basic assumptions of modern psychology. Such doctrines as behaviorism, determinism, and associationism are considered, as well as the men who developed them. Prerequisite, 400 or permission.

The evaluation and use of various types of instructional materials in teaching, with emphasis on the role of the library program in implementing the curriculum. Not open to librarians or teacher-librarians.

451 CHILDREN'S LITERATURE I (3) A

A survey of children's literature for teachers, librarians, and others interested in evaluating and using children's books according to the needs, interests, and abilities of children.

452 STORYTELLING (3) Sp

The role of the storyteller in the past and present. Selection, preparation, and presentation from folk and contemporary literature for various groups and purposes.

- 485 SEMINAR IN LIBRARY PROGRAMS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE (3) W
A course designed to provide an opportunity for discussing changing concepts in library development for children and young people and for planning programs that reflect current educational trends. Prerequisites, 454 or equivalent, and permission of instructor.

SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK

- 401 PRINCIPLES OF INTERVIEWING (2) ASp
The interview as a basic method in helping people. Analysis of case records with objective of identifying processes and techniques of skillful interviewing; ways in which purpose and setting of the interview influence its nature and course. Prerequisite, upper-division standing.

SECRETARIAL STUDIES

The Secretarial Studies program offers courses that are designed to meet the needs of students who are preparing for positions as secretaries and administrative assistants and those who wish to develop competency in typewriting, shorthand, and office machines. These courses also are required in partial fulfillment of the Business Education major and minor.

- 112 SECRETARIAL STUDIES (2) Sp
Advanced typewriting; emphasis on the development of production skills in the solution of office typewriting problems. Prerequisite, 111.

- 115 OFFICE MACHINES (3) W
Instruction in the operation of full-bank and ten-key adding machines; rotary, printing, and key-driven calculators; introduction to digital computer (optional).

- 118 FORKNER SHORTHAND (3) AS
Daytime schedule only.

- 119 FORKNER SHORTHAND (3) A
Development of dictation and transcription skills. Students with one or more high school units in Forkner shorthand should consult Secretarial Studies instructors for proper course placement. Prerequisites, 118 or equivalent and 111 (111 may be taken concurrently).

- 120 GREGG SHORTHAND (3) A
Theory of Gregg shorthand. Students who present one or more units of Gregg shorthand as entrance credit may not receive credit for this course. Students with one or more high school units in shorthand should consult Secretarial Studies instructors for proper course placement. Prerequisite, one semester of typewriting.

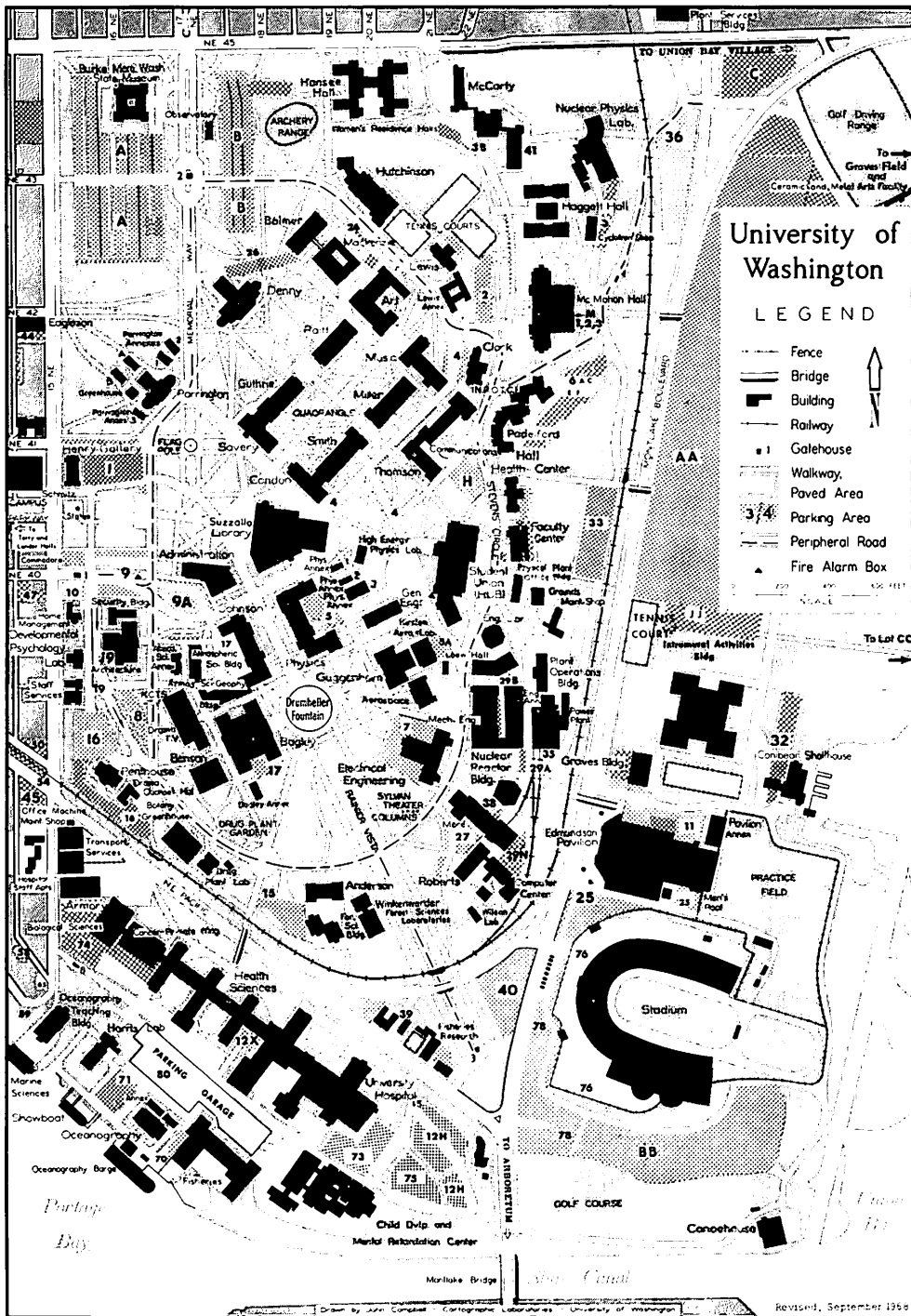
- 121 GREGG SHORTHAND (3) W


- 122 ADVANCED SHORTHAND (3) Sp
Development of dictation and transcription skills. Prerequisites, 119 or 121 or equivalent, and 111.

- 111 SECRETARIAL STUDIES (2) Wp
Intermediate typewriting; improvement of speed and accuracy; emphasis on business letters, tabulated material, and manuscripts; application of rules for correct copy. Prerequisite, one semester of typewriting or equivalent.
